Of course the sales of tandems and women's specific Stellar bikes remain stronger than usual, but we were well prepared for that this year.


An Industry Standard

My wife and I purchased our Willie Weir touring (WW Adventure) bikes late this spring with the glee of kids getting their first set of wheels. I haven't anticipated a bike purchase this much since that JC Higgins used one-speed I got from Aurora Cycle in the 1950's.

Karen and I have done some modest bike touring before in the U.S. and Europe (not quite Willie and Kat Weir touring Eastern Turkey....at least, not yet). However, overseas, we had to haul our own non-folding bikes through airports, public transit venues, and hotels or opt for rental bikes. Yuck. We're still recovering from biking that first freewayesque traffic circle outside Heathrow Airport (near London) where the cars were whizzing by us off of the M1 on the "wrong" side of the road at 70 mph. And those rental bikes in France weren't much better than that 1950's one-speed I had. With our new wonderful collapsible bikes, we'll be able to start our tours at any place that's convenient for us.

While we're not kids by any means (try mid 50's), we are still pretty active, having done multiple marathons, cross country and downhill ski vacations, biking, etc. in our middle years. But earlier this year we weren't all that fit. I hadn't ridden a bike at all in 2004 until we got these cycles from R and E in June. But we decided to get in shape quickly and bike from our front door in Tacoma to San Francisco by the end of the summer.

The first day of the trip, this September 1st, it poured rain and even hailed on us. However, from then on, the weather was wonderful. We followed the STP route to Portland, went down the Willamette valley to near Eugene, and took little used Highway 36 to the Oregon Coast. We followed the coast highway (101) and some parallel back roads down the Oregon and Northern California coasts and through the redwoods. We turned west at Leggett, went up the notorious "Leggett Hill" south of the Avenue of the Giants, and followed Highway 1 down the spectacular and less crowded California coast to the City by the Bay.

We had a wonderful time. Our somewhat less than direct route ended up being about 1,000 miles. We covered 50 to 100 miles a day. When we had another tourist couple (from France, as it turned out, and excited that we had biked before in their homeland) take our picture as we prepared to cross the Golden Gate Bridge, we were fit, happy, and totally pleased with our bikes.

The WW's rode like dreams. The 27 speeds were useful on the numerous 500 to 700 and occasional 1,000 to 2,000 foot hills. The frame was light but sturdy and handled smooth back roads, pot-holed streets in small coastal towns, some dirt trails we ended up on, and the streets of San Francisco with comfort. They even kept us upright as all those many "Uncle Earls", who probably shouldn't have been driving a KIA, passed us 4 inches off of our elbows in their wobbling 150 foot RV's (towing large SUV's) on Hwy 101.

We had shipped our S and S metal bike boxes (also purchased at R and E) to the San Francisco hotel before our arrival. When we reached the hotel, the clerk wheeled these containers out to us. When she asked where we had biked from, and we said Tacoma, she asked again, "No, really, where did you bike from?". When she realized we weren't kidding, her jaw dropped a bit and her eyes got large (focusing on my salt and pepper gray hair?) She took a real interest in our gear and enjoyed seeing how the bikes could be disassembled.

After the mandatory post ride FOOD, we opened the boxes, took the bikes apart, and put them in. It was a relative breeze, even after a 1,000 mile trip that we had completed moments before. We stored them in our rooms while we "did" San Francisco for the next few days. The return trip with our suit cased bikes traveling on the airporter, being wheeled through the airport (where we checked the bikes in their suitcases like any other luggage without a bicycle surcharge), and riding home from SeaTac in the trunk of our friend's car was flawless.

We really love our new bikes. If you'd like technical information about them, contact the R and E staff. We're not stupid, but we ain't bike techies.

Thanks to all the R & E staff (and also to Willie for designing such a great bike) for giving us what we anticipate being the ticket to numerous bike adventures in the future.

You'll Never Know if You Don't Tri

When I teach classes on getting ready for your first triathlon one of the biggest questions I hear is, "what can I expect on race day?". I even have a whole section in my class on what to expect on race day. I'd like to share with you some of the most commonly asked questions to make your first triathlon a fun and rewarding day!

If you are concerned about how to get in all the swim, bike and run training to be ready for the race, check out the R+E's training plan in this newsletter.

What do I do with all my gear on race morning?

A few races (like Danskin) require that you drop off your bike the day before in the transition area. Most races don't do this, so you will have all your gear to get into the transition area on race morning. The transition area is where you have a designated spot (usually a rack with a sign with the athlete's corresponding race number) to put your gear. Only registered athletes are allowed in the transition area.

What do I need in the transition area?

Anything for the race that you are not wearing for the swim. After the swim you will run to your transition spot and remove your wetsuit (R+E rents and sells them) and swim cap and goggles. Since nudity is not allowed in the transition area, make sure you are wearing your swim suit or short and top under your wetsuit! If you want to ride in a jersey and short - just wear it under the wetsuit (saves lots of time and really hard to get on dry clothes when you're wet!). For the bike ride you need your bike, hemlet, sunglasses, cycling shoes, socks and gloves (both optional). After the bike you will return to your transition spot and leave your bike, cycling shoes and helmet and put on your running shoes.

How soon before the race start should I arrive at the race site?

Many of the races have their swims in waves of around 100 athletes leaving every few minutes. Even if you have a later wave start it is best to arrive 90 min. to 2 hours before the first wave start to allow time to park and get your gear into the transition area. The transition area will close down before the start of the first swim wave. This will allow you time to get set up and not feel rushed.

What do I eat BEFORE the race?

First rule of race day nutrition is - don't try something new! Eat what you normally eat before a morning workout. Some examples are: yogurt, banana, sports drink, bagels, toast and energy bars. Get in 300-500

calories about 2 hours before the start. Remember you won't be eating once the race starts for 12-40 minutes while in the water.

What do I eat DURING the race?

Remember the first rule of race day nutrition - don't try something new! If your triathlon is going to take you over 1 hour then you will

need to take in some calories on the bike. Sports drinks taken on the bike are the easiest way to go. For every hour of exercise over 1 hour you need 30-60 grams of Carbohydrates(CHO). For example a sport gel is about 20-23 grams of CHO and a small water bottle of sports drink contains about 34 CHO in 16 fluid ounces. Most athletes are able to tolerate a CHO food over food with lots of fat or protein (which are harder to digest while working out hard). The key with food is to try it in training to see if it works for you. Many athletes are different on which products work well for them. Try this in training to give you better training sessions and learn what will work on race day! Avoid running out of fuel (the bonk) on your race day!

What if I can't find my bike after the swim?

Before the race, after you have set up your transition area, it is time to get familiar with the transition area. This is why it is so important to arrive early to the race. Find where you will exit the swim and run to your transition area. Count the number of racks to yours or find a landmark.

Don't choose someone else's bike or gear though, as it may be gone when you get there. Now find where the bike leaves the transition area. Then find where the bike comes back to the transition area. Many times this is not the same place as where you left for the bike ride. Again count the racks or use landmarks to find your transition spot. Remember your bike will be with you, not on the rack, for an easy landmark. Then find where you will leave the transition to start the run. In doing this you even get in a 5-10 minute jog to warm up for the race!

How do I lay out my transition area?

Rack your bike either by the seat or handlebars with a water bottle containing a sports drink (see what to eat during above).

Then layout the following on a towel:

run shoes with elastic laces (easy to get on)

socks (optional)

run hat

run shirt (optional)

bike shoes

helmet

sunglasses

gloves (optional)

race number on race belt (wear for bike and run)

cycling/run clothes (I recommend wearing your cycling clothes under your wetsuit -see above)

On you for the swim start:

timing chip on ankle strap (most races are doing this now to get accurate split and transition times)

swim suit or cycling clothes wetsuit

goggles

swim cap (most races provide) heart rate monitor or watch

Other things needed for race morning:

body glide to wear under wetsuit

- cuts down on chafing and easier to get out of sunscreen

scissors

tape - put bike race number on with dry clothes for after the race

Where should I line up for the swim start?

For most athletes in their first triathlon, it's best to line up on the outside of the course and at the back of your wave start. If you line up too close to the front and on the buoy

line - then everyone will come your way during the swim. If you have not swam in a pack on the open water this can be an uncomfortable experience.

Can I draft on the bike?

NO! This is a time trial. The draft rule is 3 bike lengths from you to the next bike. Stay to the right side of the road and only move to the left side of the lane to pass other cyclists. Then move back to the right to allow faster cyclists to move past safely and quickly.

Single Minded?

This morning I was talking with one of our baristas, Carolyn, about her fit on her single speed bike. When I looked out the window at the bike rack, I noticed that almost every bike in the rack at the moment (about 5) was some kind of single speed. While we were talking, a customer came in and asked "what's the deal with the bikes with no gears?" I decided an article was in order.

What?

A single speed bike is simply a bike with one gear but comes in many forms.

- A track racing bike (for the purist)
- An old road frame that has been built up with only one gear (for the scavenger)
- A single speed mountain bike (for the masochist)

Some single speeds have a freewheel that allow you to coast, and some have a fixed gear (fixie) that allows no coasting (this is the way that a track bike is built).



For fun. The single speed bike is an addition to most people's biking experience. There is very little maintenance. The bikes run very quiet, and they are light weight without all of those gears. Some people like them to help improve their cadence (fixies). I've got one customer that has bought several bikes from us over the last couple of decades, but he says that his single speed is his choice when he wants a 'bounce around town' fun bike. Single speeds also appeal to that minimalistic side in all of us.

$\mathsf{Where}?$

Here at R+E Cycles, of course. We carry the KHS Track bike that is perfectly suited (with some modifications) for single speed or fixed gear riding. This is one of the most popular entry level bikes used for this purpose. The great thing about this bike is that it is set up to accept fenders, a rear rack and a front hand brake. These are great to have if you intend to ride the bike on the road, but most stock track bikes don't have these features built-in. With the modifications that we do to the KHS this bike sells for just \$799.

Another option that we have been doing a lot of is building a custom Rodriguez single speed. Prices range from \$1500 to as much as you want to spend. Obviously when we build a custom we can tailor every aspect of the bike to your personality and intended usage. Most of the staff here rides and owns some



form of single speed, and we'd happy to answer questions or set something up for you to try.

What were you wearing under there? Think Out Of The Box!

<u>low Much is a Tune-Up</u>

How much is a Tune-up? This time of year, we hear that question several times a day. Shopping 'tuneups' on the phone is common practice in the bike industry. A question arises though, when one shop has a 'tune-up' for \$50 and another shop has a 'tuneup' for \$150, yet another shop has a 'tune-up' for \$100. Are these 'tune-ups' the same service at the different shops? Absolutely not. You see, 'tune-up' is a very nonspecific term. The prices vary so much because the shops' version of a 'tune-up' varies.

Professional bike shops calculate their rates on a 'tuneup' by determining how much time they will spend working on your bicycle. Shops in our area bill out labor at \$50-\$60 per hour. So, a \$50 'tune-up' will include a professional mechanic working on your bike for about an hour. That's about enough time to tighten the cables, wave a rag over the bike, perform a basic check of the bearing adjustments and fill out the paperwork. If your bike needs more work than that, it will cost more than \$50. A more expensive 'tune-up' will be more thorough, and less rushed. This is truly an area of our industry where you 'get what you pay for'.

I think the better question is: How much of a tune-up does my bike need?" The answer to this question is very difficult to determine without seeing the bike. (If you know of a person who can accurately determine the answer to this question over the phone, I would love to hire them).

My recommendation is to take your bike to a shop that you trust, and have them look it over. In our shop, we will look over your bike, and give you a free estimate of the cost before we perform any work. If your bike needs one of our complete service packages, that's what we'll do. Otherwise, we can recommend the work that your bike needs and that's what we'll do and charge you for. See you on the road!
